

SEABROOK BLAZE DESTROYS HOUSE



A Balmoral house was completely destroyed by fire on the afternoon of Saturday 24th January despite efforts by fire crews. The mudbrick & fibro house at the end of Seabrook Road (formerly West Road) caught fire shortly before 3:00pm, at the time of a violent electrical storm. Yerrinbool responded quickly, but unfortunately the blaze had taken hold before crews could arrive. Fire fighters worked through rain and fought thick smoke in an effort to extinguish the fire using water from tankers as well as by pumping from a nearby dam. Live electrical wires posed a hazard to crews as they worked around them, waiting for two hours until Integral Energy could disconnect wires and confirm them dead.


Once extinguished, an officer from the Fire Investigation Unit carried out a detailed examination of the sight

focusing on an area just inside the front door where he believed the fire began. Here there were electrical appliances plugged in. This, coupled with a burned fuse in the electrical box led the officer to the conclusion that a lightning strike had caused a power surge which had started the fire in one of the appliances.

The family who had left the house, a weekender, shortly before the storm, were shocked to hear of the news and were distressed upon their return, one being cared for by ambulance officers.

News from the....

Balmoral Association.

Since the last Village Voice the Association has put together a submission to Wingecarribee Shire Council for a community grant to fence the hall and its grounds.

Grants are given each year by the council for worthwhile projects which will benefit the community. The Balmoral Association were successful in the past in gaining funding for the renovation of the hall kitchen and thought that fencing the hall would be another worthwhile improvement to the village.

With a fence, vandalism would be minimised, as there have recently been cars tearing up the grass around the hall. The other reason for the project is that during functions such as the Christmas party, children would no longer be at risk of being hit by cars on the 100km/h stretch of road just metres from the hall doors. With this improvement in safety the possibility of a pre-school, playgroup or similar activity happening in the hall would be greater.

In keeping with the rural tone of the village, the fence will be a solid post and rail fence, with a wire mesh backing. Although the Association does not have a great deal of money for the project, which is estimated to be worth over \$6000, the hope is that members of the Balmoral community will contribute the labour, reducing the cost to that of materials only. This cost will, if the grant is successful, be met by council. Below is the summation of costs as quoted on the submission to the council's Grants Committee.

National Parks & Wildlife Clarify Rules

In a recent meeting at the Balmoral Fire Shed, National Parks and Wildlife Local Ranger Michelle Rutkauskas and Illawarra Area Manager Jennifer Bean outlined the regulations for the area to the west of the village now known as the Bargo State Recreation Area.

The land was classified as a State Recreation Area and not a National Park due to the mining leases across the area. Basically, the rules are similar to those of a National Park. In a State Recreation Area vehicles are permitted on some designated roads, as is the case with the Bargo State Recreation Area.

The roads between Balmoral and Buxton which are signposted with large wooden National Parks symbols are public roads to the Little River swimming holes and will remain open to the public. The track from Boundary Rd to the waterhole has been closed for public safety, while the many minor tracks which lead from Wilson Drive to the Waterhole have been covered in an attempt to regenerate plant life. The Powerlines Road from Little River to Hilltop has been closed, as has Bolans Road from Central Road onwards. The reasoning behind the road closures is that with less tracks there will be less chance of vandalism, rubbish dumping, cars being dumped and set alight or even the deliberate lighting of bushfires.

Signs along the boundaries of the 'prohibited area' explain the restrictions. No horseriding is a piece of National Park legislation common to all National Parks and State Recreation Areas. No Domestic Pets means that no domestic pets are allowed in the park, even with a lead on. No Unauthorised Vehicles means that only National Park service vehicles, police and fire brigade are permitted to enter.

Fire hazard reduction will still take place in the SRA, as outlined in National Park's Fire Management Plan. The Balmoral Rural Fire Brigade will be pursuing this issue further over the coming months.

Another interesting point to come out of the meeting was that National Parks & Wildlife have listed the crown land to the east of the village for acquisition. Further information will follow in future Village Voices.

Fire Brigade News...

one for the brigade. In addition to the house fire on Seabrook Road, Balmoral Brigade were called to fires at Fitzroy Falls and Linwood Park.

major concern throughout December and early January though, was the fire burning to the west of Balmoral. This was burning in land managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Water Board.

The fire began on 23rd November last year near Yerranderie and flared up each time weather became unfavourable. The management of the fire was jointly controlled by Wollondilly Fire Control, the National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Water Board. With the fire almost two hours drive along dirt fire trails, crews from all over

the state worked long shifts in attempts to control the fire, some of which burned in inaccessible country. As the exercise carried on through November, and throughout December, stress on crews, trucks, roads and bridges forced authorities to look at other transport alternatives. Choppers were then used to fly crews into the Macarthur Flats control area from Picton, where they met their trucks. A map of the burned out land has been included to show the huge area affected, and where it was in relation to Balmoral. In a separate fire near Wingello, firefighter David Quinlivan was killed while he and his crew fought a fire in state forest. The Balmoral crew would like to extend their sympathy to David's family, and have


The recent fire season has been a busy. Wingello victims can do so through any National Australia Bank.



What Flower is That?


It was somewhere up the country, in a land of rock and scrub That they formed an institution called the Geebung Polo Club......

So starts the first few lines of Banjo Patterson's classic Australian poem about life in the Australian bush.

But few people realise that polo club is named after a classic group of Australian plants called the Geebungs. The small yellow tubular flower with 4 petals that fold back is easily recognized on all species. But the leaves and the stems vary greatly and until the flowers come out many people do not realise that very different looking plants are related.


The most easily recognized Geebung around Balmoral is the Smooth-leaf Geebung *Persoonia levis*, to give its scientific name. It is a medium shrub with black papery bark and large oval bright green leaves that make it stand out amongst the dull sclerophyll vegetation. The green berries are edible and said to be a popular bush tucker. They are rather tasteless but probably nutritious because I often find them in kangaroo droppings when they are in season.

There are about 7 species around Balmoral and one species *Persoonia hirsuta* is particularly rare and endangered. This geebung is a small shrub to knee or waist height with small leaves covered in fine hairs. It is quite obviously a Geebung when in flower about Nov.-Dec.



Historical Feature

Many people may have seen the set of four old train & station photos which the fire brigade often sells at functions, but here is a photo from State Rail Archives which is much older. You may notice in this photo that the slope at the end of the platform is rotting and in need of repair. In the more common photos, obviously taken later, this slope has very noticeable replaced boards. Note too, the lack of pine trees behind the station, and the young age of the one on Wilson Drive. A very early photo. If you could date the photo, let me know.
