

DOZER BLOCKS RIVER ST.



River Street was blocked to traffic for two hours by a bulldozer on Wednesday night, 2nd February after a mishap while trying to load it onto a truck.

The dozer, a 26 ton Komatsu, had completed some excavating in Lemon Lane and was being loaded onto a float at the top of River street when the engine stalled.

" Without the engine running," explained the driver, " the brakes did not operate. The machine rolled down the ramps and fell onto its side."

Balmoral Fire Brigade attended the scene and dealt with a small amount of fuel which had escaped, as well as assisting passing traffic. The road was later completely blocked when a 50 ton crane was called in from Narellan to right the dozer.

Once back on its tracks the dozer was started and moved into Amy St, where it spent the night until it was successfully loaded the following morning Scars on River st remain the only evidence of the incident. Pg 1

Village Vandalism Continues: Parents Unaware.

Continuing acts of petty vandalism throughout the village indicate that parents may be unaware of what their children and their friends do after dark.

Letterboxes have been regularly damaged or removed from their posts or fences on a number of occasions and the Village Hall toilet block has been damaged more than once over the past few months.

These incidents seem to occur on Friday or Saturday nights coinciding with parties held in the village.

Residents have compiled a list of dates on which the incidents occurred, including 18th December, 31st December and 8th January.

Adding to the frustration of letterboxes being damaged, noise and disturbances have, on occasions, occurred late into the night which have prompted some villagers to call Police to report the incidents.

Picton Police have suggested that, "If a disturbance occurs or if your property is damaged then you should contact us immediately. In this way, if a number of reports are made, we will attend to the incident more promptly. Knowing that we are involved will hopefully discourage the offenders."

Historical Feature

The Balmoral Village Tennis Club

The original tennis court was established in or about the 1920s. Apparently it was well used by the local people. They had competition tennis along the Loopline Villages, where the villages from Picton to Hilltop played one another. The original court was antbed surface.

I was talking to Shirley Harvey from Buxton who used to play with Ella Marsh, Bill Marsh, Dot Brown and Keith Murdock for the Balmoral Team. The Marshes

won numerous trophies.

In 1980, a group of us, Dot Brown, Dot & Charlie Wilson, Mavis & Dal Bridge, Joe & Anne Enfield, Lance and myself (I hope I haven't forgotten anyone) decided to clear the site of the original court. We cleared the shrubbery by hand, no machinery, so as not to wreck the surface. It came up well and we swept and rolled it until it was fairly even. We found two nets under the hall and strung one between two posts.

We played on it for a year or so and took the opportunity to speak to a councillor who was at a meeting in the hall. We showed him what we had done and asked if the Council could get us some loam to fill in the dents. We must have impressed him because they not only put down a new surface, Bullio gravel, but fence posts, wire and a net winder, which we didn't already have. We purchased a new net from the Council through Government Stores at a reduced price.

Since then we've had two more surfaces, bitumen and an all weather surface. They were obtained through a dollar for dollar system with the Council. We have worked hard since 1980 to keep the tennis court functioning.
