BUSHFIRE BURNS PARK TO EDGE OF VILLAGE

Central Road Firetrail Saves Balmoral

Bushfires which devastated much of NSW over the Christmas to New Year period have left a charred reminder to the west of the village in the Bargo State Recreation Area, Thirlmere Lakes and Nattai National Parks.

The fires which roared through Warragamba, Silverdale and The Oaks on Christmas Day reached Couridjah on Christmas night and burned through the parks reaching Buxton on Boxing Day, still fanned by hot dry winds and fed by heavy fuel loadings. Crews from across Sydney were rushed in to protect property.

Once across the Shire boundary, The Bargo State Recreation Area remains Wingecarribee began aggressive closed nearly two months after the fires. firefighting campaign of constructing

firetrails and undertaking backburning, beginning with the reconstruction of the Central Road Firetrail, which used to exist behind properties on the western fringe of the Village.

Over the next three weeks, fire crews from the shire and others from the Victorian Country Fire Authority contained the fires within the National Parks with a 160km long backburning operation stretching from Balmoral to Mandemar near Wombeyan Caves. In all over 100 000 hectares of National Park was burned, with no loss of life or property in the Wingecarribee Shire.

From the Editor:

In my many days and nights at the fireshed, along with the other members of the fire brigade, I was constantly amazed at the community spirit, the generosity and people's willingness to help in any way they could. It was amazing on Boxing Day morning that residents came to the shed with loaves of bread made into sandwiches, Christmas hams and turkey, hot meals, scones and cakes and drinksand the list goes on. But it didn't stop there. It continued for days. In fact, Balmoral was known among the other brigades as the place to stop in for a cuppa and a snack. On behalf of the brigade, thank you so much for making life so much easier. There are far too many to thank and I'll probably leave someone out, but Sue, Maree and Cathy especially, your cooking was greatly appreciated by everyone.

And then there were the people who, even though not members of the brigade, stayed at the shed for long shifts, often right through the night, filling firetrucks with water and fuel, or making sure that the phone was answered and the urn was full when the crews came in. Thanks Len, Lance, Dave, Loyd, Brad and Peter.

And what about the members of the Brigade. On behalf of the Village, can I thank you for the time and effort you put in over nearly three weeks. Just like me, many gave up your holidays, some gave up work, families or building your own homes.....but it was worth it. We still have a village!

Train Welcomed by Locals

As the Christmas fires approached Balmoral on Boxing Day morning, Peter Lawrence, Captain of the Balmoral Rural Fire Brigade, made a phone call to the Thirlmere Rail Museum, resulting in a train visiting Balmoral for the first time in twelve years, and a desperately needed water supply being delivered to the village.

Neil Finey from the museum took most of the day to rearrange trains at the museum and fill two 7000L water tankers, which were once used to supply steam trains, then push them with a diesel locomotive up to Balmoral.

The train was stopped at both Couridjah and Buxton by Police, who did not want to let the train pass, but Peter Lawrence, determined to have water on hand, saw the decision overturned.

The story, which has become legendary in the Brigade, goes that Peter compared the number of stripes on his own captains shirt, to those on the police officer's, telling him that they "both have three stripes and that that train is going through."

As the train pulled into Balmoral, a large crowd of residents gathered to welcome it. A tape was stretched across the track and cut by the train as it arrived in true style.

The diesel locomotive returned to Thirlmere that afternoon, leaving the two tankers parked on the tracks behind the fireshed to be used for the duration of the fire. Fire crews replenished their tanks from them day and night until the fire had passed.

The departure of the tankers on Sunday 26th January was just as popular as their arrival, with train enthusiasts travelling long distances to see them off.



Fire Wrap-up and Thank you

The Balmoral Village Volunteer Rural Fire service would like to take this opportunity to thank village residents and their visitors for their generous donations of money, food, drink, assistance and moral support for the duration of the Christmas/New Year fires.

The Brigade was involved in active firefighting starting from from 30/10/01 at Mangrove Mountain, near Gosford for backburning and property protection.

After lightning strikes in the Nattai National Park, the brigade were called in to Oakdale on 10/12/01 for property protection and then for backburning at Nattai Village on 12/12/01.

On 18, 19 and 20/12 the brigade were stationed at Camelot west of Hilltop, supporting helicopter refuelling.

The brigade commenced local backburning on 26/12/01, which continued until 31/12/01. Balmoral then assisted in the continuation of this backburn through to the Colo-Vale and Mandemar area, keeping them busy from 1/1/02 until 12/1/02.

Once again, in the face of adversity our small community has shown its great strength and support.

Fire Restrictions

A reminder that fire restrictions are in force until 1st April, 2002 unless otherwise announced. This date may change depending on weather conditions. This is a NSW Government requirement and there are penalties for breaking the law.

Until the end of 'fire season' a permit is required for all fires (not barbecues).


