LOCAL MEMBER ACTS ON LOCAL ISSUES

Peta Seaton, Member for Southern Highlands, recently visited Balmoral to discuss local issues with residents of the Village. The meeting, held in the Village Hall, was attended by a small number, but several worthwhile concerns were brought to the local member's attention.

Residents discussed issues relating to the condition of roads and the need for roadside vegetation removal, the location of the bus stop and bus routes, the speed limit on Wilson Drive, the disapproval of entry fees into the Thirlmere Lakes National Park, rising insurance premiums due to Balmoral's postcode, increased power costs for Village Hall, litter and dumping issues and illegal quarrying operations.

Power Bill Saving

Local Member, Peta Seaton, has recently sent correspondence to the Minister for Energy requesting an explanation for the Association being charged an 'access fee' and virtually commercial rates on power, despite the fact that they are a non-profit organisation.

The result of this representation has been a reduction of the tariff from commercial to domestic rates. the Association saving approximately \$79.20 per year.

Hazard Reduction 2001

The brigade has made plans to conduct hazard reduction this winter in the following locations around Village.

* The area to the north of the Village on the eastern side of the railway line, from the back boundary of properties on Railway Parade through crown land as far as Weir Road to the east and Balmoral Park Rd to the north.

* From the southern end of Railway Pde, along the railway line, east into bushland.

* The area to the south-west of the village, bounded by Coates Road, Bolans Road and the rear of properties along Wilson Drive. (This will happen in conjunction with the National Parks and Wildlife Service)

* Completion of the burn previously conducted behind properties on Station St, including Truro.

* Along sections of the railway line from Buxton to Saddleback.

Chains for chainsaws can sharpened at the fireshed Wednesday nights for a fee of \$4.00 per chain. Discount for Brigade members.


Membership / Meetings



Bulbs for Balmoral

Now is the time to plant bulbs for spring colour. In this edition, we will look at a few of the more unusual bulbs that might add a bit of interest to

vour garden.

Babiana: The Baboon Flower consists of around 50 species native to South Africa. They are available in a range of colours from blues and layenders


through to reds, purples and whites. They are best planted about 10cm deep in a full sun position, and if possible, protected from frost. The growth through winter may be damaged by severe frosts, but to overcome this it is possible to plant when the danger of frosts is over for a late summer flowering. Otherwise the flowers will appear in spring. The flowers are like mini gladioli and are shown on stems about 30cm high.

Ipheion: Spring Starflowers are native to South America and are one of the longest flowering of the spring bulbs. Each bulb produces a number of starshaped flowers in pastel blue through to white on stems about 10cm tall. Plant about 5cm deep, in a full sun to part shade position, and allow to naturalise for a great show. When not flowering, the soft green leaves give an interesting effect.


Right: Spring Starflowers (Ipheium)

Zephyranthes: The Autum Crocus, unlike the other bulbs, flowers at this time of year. There are about 70 species native to the Americas, and most are frost tender. Zephyranthes candida is not, and is suitable to this area. It is a hardy species with white, cup shaped flowers. There are also yellows and pinks available but these are not quite as hardy as the white. Autumn Crocus is suitable for most conditions, and has been used in roundabouts to great effect. When not flowering, the grass like foliage adds interest to the garden, much like Mondo Grass. A vigorous clumper, divide when flowering to spread the display.

Although these bulbs shouldn't require too much preparation, to give them a better start, dig in some well rotted compost where the bulbs are to be planted. After planting at the appropriate depth, water once and wait till you see shoots. Then apply some slow release fertilizer and treat like the other plants in the garden. The Autumn Crocus and Spring Flowers should be available in pots and will need to be planted to the depth of the potting mix.

Ixia: This hardy bulb is available in a range of colours from blues and pinks, to oranges, yellows and white. The most interesting species is Ixia viridiflora with a beautiful metallic green/turquoise flower on stems about 60cm tall. Plant about 5cm deep in a full sun position, as the flowers tend to close up on cloudy days and at night. Flowers will appear in late spring through to early summer, and can be used as a cut flower. Foliage is thin and up to 60cm as well.

Most of these should be available at the local garden centres now, or call up some of the bulb suppliers like Tesselaars (03 97379811, www.tesselaar.net.au) or the Blue Dandenongs Bulb Farm (039756 6766, www.blued.com.au) and ask for a mail order catalogue. For something really interesting, call the Kangaroo Island Bulb Farm (08 8553 2480) and ask about the miniature gladioli.
