Balmoral Village has had some wonderful and clever people living here. Take, for example Mrs Hammond. Mr Hammond had been the manager of an orange orchard in Bourke. The oranges they grew must have been superb as they were exported to England for the King's table. Mrs Hammond had been the Matron at Bourke Hospital.

The Hammonds moved to Balmoral when he retired early in the last century. Mrs Hammond became everybody's grandmother — you were sick — she nursed you, you were getting married — she made your wedding cake, she was always there for anyone who needed her.

They did it hard in those days, she carried the water in a bucket from the Dripping Rock - a spring some ½ kilometer from her house. She used to drive to Sydney every week to take flowers from her own and others' gardens to the markets. She couldn't have been a very confident driver as she never learned to reverse. She would go as far as Liverpool, park there and take the train to the City.

In those days there was a train service weekdays from Sydney and many people came here for the weekends, one of these was her neighbour and while he was away she picked the beans he had growing along the fence entered them in the Show and won him a prize. I wish I could have known her!

Balmoral Village Volunteer Rural Fire Brigade News

We have had a mild summer with good rainfall which has kept fire calls down. On previous years the beginning of April sees the end of the fire season, so we all need to get busy preparing for next summer.

What does this mean to us? There will be larger amounts of fuel on the ground for when we hit a dry patch again.

What can we do to prepare? Balmoral Village Brigade will be conducting hazard reductions over the next couple of months.

- *Firstly heading to the North toward Buxton from the main railway crossing to Balmoral Park along the rail corridor.
- *Then finishing the Southern end of the rail corridor heading to Hilltop.
- *The Eastern side of the Village
- *National Parks is planning to continue the hazard reduction on the Western side of the village, we will be assisting with this.

We will also be conducting some hazard reductions on private properties

What can you do? Maintain your property well by: keeping the grass short, clean gutters out, cut branches overhanging your home, do not drop grass cuttings or tree branches across the road or behind your property. Compost it, or, if we are not in the fire season burn it off slowly. Call us if you need any assistance with a burn off. Know what you will do in the event of a major fire, are you prepared to protect your home or when you will leave or where you

will go and what you will take (important papers, family heirlooms). Don't try to leave at the last minute – it is too late then!

Remember – If you are going to burn off give your neighbours the courtesy of letting them know well in advance and be prepared with correct clothing and water on hand. Clear the area where you are going burn, only light the fire in good weather conditions (watch the Danger sign at the crossing). This means not too hot, not too windy – just right.

We only had a few calls to burning off in the Village during the fire season. There is no burning off permitted beginning of October to end of March. Please call myself before burning if you are unsure.

Finally, after many years Balmoral Village is getting a new Fire Station in the same location - but the entry/exit will be between the cross over between Railway Parade and Wilson Drive, not facing the homes as it was in the past, thank you to those residents for your patience over the years. The construction of this station will take a couple of months to completion, when there will be an official opening of the station. We would like to see you there, we will keep you posted on the date.

There will be plenty for the brigade to finish in the new station as we pretty much get the shell, power, toilets, kitchen cupboards, and shower, the rest we are going to need to buy- fridge, computer. cupboards, chairs, tables crockery etc, Any donation of money (which is tax deductible as we are a non profitable organisation) would be greatly appreciated to assist in getting the station up and running as soon as possible. Or if you have an item that is not used and in good condition that would be greatly appreciated also. Or offers from any of the tradespeople in the village to donate some time completing different tasks would be great,

Due to not having a station the brigade is meeting for our monthly meeting in the Village hall on the first Wednesday at 7.30pm and travelling to other brigades to do training. When we get our new station we will meet on the first Wednesday of the month for our monthly meeting, to discuss any issues and information. Training is in the third or fourth Wednesdays

For anyone who would like to protect our beautiful village either as an active member, assisting with hazard reductions and fire calls or, as an ancillary member assisting in the station with radio and back up work for the fire crews please contact myself or another member of the brigade and have a chat about how you can help our village and what is needed to get joining under way. When you see us in the new station please drop in and say hello and have a look around.
