No Fire Permits are issued during the Fire Season and there is No Burning off Permitted, from the beginning of October to the end of March each year.

Brigade News:

What a start to the fire season!

16,500h burnt out in both Wingecarribee and Wollondilly Shires, no lives lost, no serious injuries, no occupied dwellings destroyed, 2 unoccupied dwellings destroyed, some vehicles destroyed, some sheds destroyed and sadly some pets lost to a section 44 (state fire emergency). This in itself is amazing considering the ferocity in which this fire took off.

We did get a good touch up around the Village causing some damage on and around some properties, over all we faired well.

I was asked by a number of people why the fire even when it was gone from our Village was still called Hall Road, Balmoral Village. The answer is that it gets its name from the beginning and until the end of time from where the origin of the fire was.

I would like to say how proud I am of your Volunteer Firefighters who recently undertook a 13 day fire campaign to protect our beautiful village and succeeded. The effort and time by the RFS Brigades and some of our residents who day and night patrolled the village was greatly appreciated, a big thank you to you all.

The support from our residents and people not living in our village was sensational, bringing in food, drinks or helping around the fire station, filling tankers and making sure the firefighters were looked after.

A huge Thank you to these amazing ladies Tracy, Jill, Amanda, Janet who cooked, cleaned and took care of the station duties.

The feed back I have received from all Brigades coming here to assist us was that in all of their years of going away to fight fires they had never received the hospitality from residents or the other Brigade as they did here in Balmoral.

PREPARE

You must make important decisions before the fire season starts

- · Know and understand your bush fire risk.
- Prepare yourself, your family, your home and property for bush fires.
- Prepare a Bush Fire Survival Plan. Update it yearly if needed!

"Preparing to Make a Bushfire Survival Plan is Not a Plan" ACT

The higher the fire danger rating, the more dangerous the conditions

- Know the fire danger rating for your area and what you need to do.
- Put your preparations into action don't wait and see.
- · Check your Bush Fire Survival Plan.

SURVIVE

Fires may threaten without warning - know what you will do to survive.

- The safest place is away from the fire your survival is the highest priority.
- Follow your Bush Fire Survival Plan and make decisions to protect you and your family.
- You need to know what to do if you are caught in a fire. You may be threatened by a fire without warning.
- Know the bush fire Alert Levels, monitor conditions and keep up to date.

What you need to know about the Fire Danger Rating Sign located in the Village

The Fire Danger Rating (FDR) is an indication of the consequences of a fire, if a fire were to start.

Be ready to act.

When the Fire Danger Rating is Severe, Extreme or Catastrophic, this means a fire will be unpredictable, uncontrollable and very fast moving. This means little or no warning about the threat of a bush fire.

The Fire Danger Rating should be your first trigger for activating your Bush Fire Survival Plan.

By choosing to Stay and Defend in the event of a bush fire you may be at risk of serious injury or death.

If there is any doubt in your mind, you should leave early in the event of a bush fire.

When a High Fire Danger Rating and above is advised, you need to take it seriously and be prepared to act.

Your Families survival may depend on it.

On Hot, Dry, Windy days you should pay extra attention to the fire risk in our area!

There are actions you can do to save time in case a fire does start:

Contain pets so they can be easily found.

Move stock to fully grazed areas.

Check water pumps and generators.

Have your Emergency Survival Kit, Personal belongings and protective clothing ready.

Listen to local media, RFS website www.rfs.nsw.gov.au or telephone 1800 679 737 for updates.

The Brigade meets at the fire station the first Wednesday of each month at 7.30pm for our monthly meetings.

Training is on most Wednesday nights from 7.30pm.

For anyone that would like to help protect our beautiful village either as an active member assisting with hazard reductions and fire calls or as an ancillary member assisting in the fire station with radio and support work for the fire crews, please contact myself or another member of the Brigade and have a chat about how you can join.

Donations are always greatly appreciated and are used to purchase safety equipment to assist the people who help to protect you.

If you see us in the station drop in to grab an application form, or to just say hello and have a look around.

Cookery Nook

Cherry ripe Bites

4 cups desiccated coconut

400 gr glace cherries

2 teasp cherry essence

1x100gr tin condensed milk

A few drops of red colouring.

For dipping:-

375 gr dark chocolate

30 gr Copha

Combine coconut, cherries, essence, colouring and condensed milk in a bowl and mix well

Roll teaspoons full into balls and refrigerate until firm Melt chocolate and Copha together. Re roll balls before dipping. Use a toothpick to dip them in the chocolate and set aside to set. They can be dipped again if required.

Chocolate Almond Balls

125grms cream cheese chopped 1 cup Nutella

325gr madeira cake crumbled

125gr Copha 180gr dark chocolate

½ cup ground almonds toasted 180gr dark ch 2 tabspns slivered almonds toasted and chopped

Silver cachous

Line a baking tray with foil.

Beat cream cheese and Nutella in a bowl until smooth, Chill until firm enough to handle.

Arrange tabsns of mixture into balls. Arrange on prepared tray.

Melt chocolate and Copha in a small saucepan on low heat. Spoon chocolate mixture over balls to cover.

Roll in almonds and cachous

. Chill until firm.
